Works Cited List: Core Elements for All Sources

Author's name. Title of source. Title of container, other contributors, version, number, publisher, publication date, location of source.

In-Text Citations

For in-text citations, the author's name and the page number should be given— either with a <u>signal phrase</u> and (parenthetical citation), or in a (parenthetical citation).

Book

<u>VanZee asserts</u> that "the tradition of women's oppression and self-liberation is embedded deep in the literature of our American culture" (123).

Periodical

Social networking sites can positively affect wellbeing if their designers include "interventions aimed at increasing the beneficial effects" of communication and self-disclosure (Wang 235).

Website

"I'm convinced that our Creator wants humans to ask hard questions," <u>states Gehrz</u> as he considers, especially, self-examination in and of the Christian church.

Block Quotes

Indent only one-half inch on the left, double spaced, no indentations on the right, no indentations at the beginning of the block.

Poetry

Use prose (paragraph) form for quoting poetry, but add two forward slashes (//) for a stanza break.

Bibliography (Works Cited)

List your created sources in alphabetical order.

URLs: Recommended/Encouraged

When using the URL, delete the "https://." If you have a DOI-- Digital Object Identifier-- for any source, use that that instead of a URL.

Publication Date

The publication date is the priority, however the accessed date is encouraged, but not required. If the publication date is not given, one *must* add the date of access. If you do add the date access one must use the word "Accessed": e.g. "Accessed 23 May 2013."
